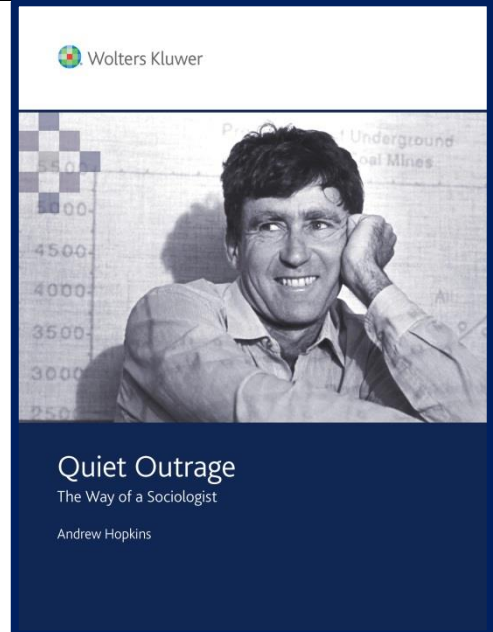
## The Way of a Sociologist

Meet Andrew Hopkins: sociologist, storyteller, academic.

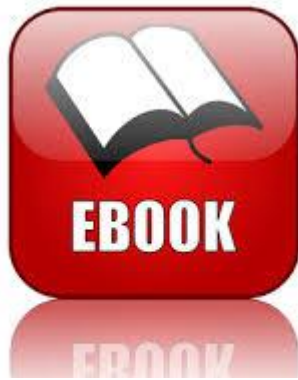
